1.0 Introduction

This program directory is intended for the system programmer responsible for program installation and maintenance. It contains information concerning the material and procedures associated with the installation of Performance Toolkit for VM. 1.1 Program Description

Performance Toolkit for VM Function Level 610 is a pre-installed, priced feature that provides performance management capabilities for VM systems and their guests. It allows systems programmers to monitor users, system performance and to analyze bottlenecks. Performance Toolkit for VM is also designed to facilitate the operation of VM systems, thereby improving operator efficiency and productivity.

2.0 Program Materials

An IBM program is identified by a program number. The program number for Performance Toolkit for VM is 5741-A07.

4.3 Cumulative Service Tape

Cumulative service for Performance Toolkit for VM is available through a periodic, preventive service tape, the Recommended Service Upgrade (RSU). The RSU tape is used to provide service updates for multiple z/VM components and features (including Performance Toolkit for VM) and is often referred to as a *stacked* RSU tape.

The stacked RSU tape can be obtained by ordering PTF UM97610.

5.0 Installation and Migration Requirements and Considerations

The following sections identify the system requirements for installing and activating Performance Toolkit for VM.

5.1 Hardware Requirements

There are no special hardware requirements for Performance Toolkit for VM.

5.2 Program Considerations

The following sections list the programming considerations for installing and activating Performance Toolkit for VM functions.

5.2.1 Operating System Requirements

Performance Toolkit for VM function level 610 supports the following VM operating system:

z/VM version 6 release 1

5.2.2 Other Program Product Requirements

GDDM® (5684-168) is optional and will be used if available.

5.2.3 Migration Considerations

5.2.3.1 Migrating from Performance Toolkit for VM, function level 5nn

The Performance Toolkit for VM customizable files, as listed in Figure 8 on page 14, can be brought over from your z/VM V5 system to your new z/VM V6.1 system. You will need to compare your Performance Toolkit for VM FL520, FL530 or FL540 files with the new shipped files and make any necessary changes. Be aware that several of the FC MONCOLL RESET subcommands in the default FCONX \$PROFILE file have been changed in Performance Toolkit for VM, function level 610.

If you use the migration procedures documented in the *z/VM:* Guide for Automated Installation and Service to migrate Performance Toolkit for VM then the files listed in Figure 8 on page 14, as well as the PROFILE EXEC for the PERFSVM user ID, will be migrated. If these customizable files were changed in Performance Toolkit for VM FL610, and you had also made changes to them on your z/VM V5.2, V5.3 or z/VM 5.4 system, then you will be told to rework your changes.

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5.2.3.2 Migrating From Performance Toolkit for VM, function level 440

If you were running Performance Toolkit for VM 4.4.0 then your customized Performance Toolkit files resided on the CCC minidisk or SFS directory VMSYS:4VMPTK40.PERFTK.CUSCONFIG. In this new level of Performance Toolkit for VM the customized files will reside on the 1CC minidisk or SFS directory VMSYS.6VMPTK10.PERFTK.CONFIG. Since the 1CC minidisk (or SFS directory) is now a production build disk you will need to update the customizable files using the VMSES/E Local Modification procedure in order to preserve your changes to these files. Refer to 6.3, "Tailoring Performance Toolkit for VM Customization Files" on page 14 for instructions on modifying or changing the Performance Toolkit for VM customizable files.

5.2.3.3 Migrating from RealTime Monitor (RTM)

Performance Toolkit for VM already provides the same information that was provided by RTM. For a cross reference of RTM commands to Performance Toolkit for VM commands see the Performance Toolkit for VM home page at:

5.2.4 Program Installation and Service Considerations

This section describes items that should be considered before you install or service Performance Toolkit for VM.

Note - z/VM Automated Service Procedure

If you modify any of the IBM-supplied default user IDs, minidisk addresses, or SFS directory names associated with Performance Toolkit for VM and you plan on using the z/VM automated service procedure (the **SERVICE** and **PUT2PROD** commands) to service your z/VM system, then you must create a PPF override for the **SERVP2P \$PPF** file.

You must also use the **VMFUPDAT SYSSUF** command to update the VM SYSSUF Software Inventory file, so that your PPF override for SERVP2P is used for automated service processing. For more information about PPF overrides, see the *z/VM: VMSES/E Introduction and Reference*.

- Performance Toolkit for VM is pre-installed on the z/VM version 6 release 1 System deliverables.
- VMSES/E is required to install and service this product.
- If multiple users install and maintain licensed products on your system, there may be a problem getting the necessary access to MAINT's 51D disk. If you find that there is contention for write access to the 51D disk, you can eliminate it by converting the Software Inventory from minidisk to Shared File System (SFS). See the z/VM: VMSES/E Introduction and Reference manual, section "Changing the Software Inventory to an SFS Directory", for information on how to make this change.
- If you choose to move Performance Toolkit for VM from minidisk to SFS, and you did not do it at initial z/VM install time, or if you want to change from the default SFS file pool or directories, then you will

need to follow the steps in Appendix B, "Moving Performance Toolkit for VM to SFS Directories and Creating a PPF Override" on page 34. These steps will have you create the SFS directories, move the files to the SFS directories and create a PPF override file.

 RSUs will be supplied as necessary. Service between RSUs can be obtained through CORrective service.

5.3 DASD Storage and User ID Requirements

Figure 6 lists the user IDs, minidisks and default SFS directory names that are used to install and service Performance Toolkit for VM.

Important Installation Notes:

- The user IDs and minidisks are listed here so that you can get an idea of the resources required by Performance Toolkit for VM. They are already defined and allocated on the z/VM System deliverable, as Performance Toolkit for VM is pre-installed.
- The CP user ID directory entry for PERFSVM is shipped with statement: SHARE ABS 3%

It is recommended that you **DO NOT CHANGE** this statement.

6.0 Installation Instructions

This chapter describes the step-by-step procedures to enable and customize Performance Toolkit for VM. The step-by-step procedures are in two-column format. The steps to be performed are in bold, large numbers. Commands for these steps are on the left-hand side of the page in bold print. Additional information for a command may exist to the right of the command.

Each step of the instructions must be followed. Do not skip any step unless directed to do so.

Throughout these instructions, the use of IBM-supplied default minidisk addresses and user IDs is assumed. If you use different user IDs, minidisk addresses, or SFS directories to support Performance Toolkit for VM, adapt these instructions as needed for your environment.

6.1 Performance Toolkit for VM Enablement and Customization Process Overview

The following is a brief description of the main steps to complete the enablement and customization of Performance Toolkit for VM.

Have you Licensed Performance Toolkit for VM?

Performance Toolkit for VM is pre-installed on z/VM version 6 release 1 in a DISABLED state. **If, and only if,** you have a license for Performance Toolkit for VM, function level 610 proceed with the installation to enable it for use.

Set Performance Toolkit for VM to the ENABLED state.

This will allow Performance Toolkit for VM to run.

Tailor customization files

Information about file tailoring for the program is presented in 6.3, "Tailoring Performance Toolkit for VM Customization Files" on page 14.

Place Performance Toolkit for VM files into production

Once the product has been tailored, the product files are copied from the test BUILD disk(s) to the production BUILD disk(s).

· Perform Post-installation Tasks

Information about the initial activation of the program is presented in 6.5, "Post-Installation Considerations" on page 15.

6.2 Enable Performance Toolkit for VM for Use

The following instructions will enable Performance Toolkit for VM for use on your system.

- 1 Log on to the MAINT user ID (that has privilege class E authority and has access to the VMSES/E code disk (default MAINT 5E5) and VMSES/E Software Inventory disk (default MAINT 51D))
- 2 If the Software Inventory disk (51D) was accessed R/O (read only) then establish write access to the Software Inventory disk.

Note: If the MAINT 51D minidisk was accessed R/O, you will need to have the user who has it linked R/W link it as R/O. You can then issue the following commands to obtain write access to it. **Do not use mw mode.** Do not continue with these procedures until a R/W link is established to the 51D minidisk.

link maint 51d 51d mr access 51d d

The 51D minidisk is where the VMSES/E Software Inventory files and other product dependent files reside.

3 Set Performance Toolkit for VM to the enabled state.

service perftk enable

This command will perform the following:

- · Set Performance Toolkit for VM as ENABLED in VMSES/E and within CP.
- · Update the CP system configuration file (SYSTEM CONFIG) on the CP primary (default CF1) parm disk.

What's Next?

Continue with 6.3, "Tailoring Performance Toolkit for VM Customization Files" on page 14.

If you do not need to tailor any customizable files at this time then you need to continue with 6.4, "Place Performance Toolkit for VM Into Production" on page 15.

Notes:

1. If, in the future, you are no longer licensed for Performance Toolkit for VM, function level 610, you must follow the instructions in Appendix C, "Disabling Performance Toolkit for VM" on page 41 to disable Performance Toolkit for VM.

6.3 Tailoring Performance Toolkit for VM Customization Files

Note: Read the section 5.2.3, "Migration Considerations" on page 7 before continuing in this section.

The following table describes the sample customization files provided with Performance Toolkit for VM that have been installed to the 1CC customization files disk.

All of the Performance Toolkit for VM customization files are delivered as replacement-maintained parts. In order to make your site changes to these files, you need to use VMSES/E to create a local modification to the files. Review the z/VM: Performance Toolkit Guide for details on configuring these files. If you need to make changes to these files that are not going to be permanent then you can copy the files to the A-disk of the user ID that will be running Performance Toolkit for VM and update them there.

To make permanent changes to the customizable files listed in Figure 8 use the following instructions to create a local modification for them.

- 1 Log on to MAINT, if you are not already logged on to it.
- **2** Create and apply the local modification

Note: Repeat this step for each file you need to modify.

a Run the LOCALMOD command to create the local modification for a customizable file.

localmod perftk partfn partft

partfn and partft is the file name and file type of the customizable file, in Figure 8, that you are modifying.

- **b** Reply to any prompt messages.
- **C** Make your changes to the displayed file. See the *z/VM: Performance* Toolkit Guide manual for details on configuring these files.

d File your changes.

====> file

Enter file on the XEDIT command line

3 Run the SERVICE command to build the local modification(s).

service perftk build

What's Next?

You have now finished tailoring Performance Toolkit for VM. Continue with 6.4, "Place Performance Toolkit for VM Into Production."

6.4 Place Performance Toolkit for VM Into Production

This step will copy the Performance Toolkit for VM files from its test BUILD disks or SFS directories to its production BUILD disks or SFS directories.

1 Copy Performance Toolkit for VM files into production.

put2prod perftk

This command may take several minutes to complete.

6.5 Post-Installation Considerations

Deploying Linux® on z/VM

If you plan to deploy Linux on z/VM see the z/VM: Getting Started with Linux on System z® publication for more information on setting up Performance Toolkit for VM to monitor your z/VM system and Linux virtual servers.

To start using Performance Toolkit for VM you need to do the following.

- 1 Log on to the PERFSVM user ID. The PERFSVM profile will run. It will access the required minidisks or SFS directories and start Performance Toolkit for VM.
- **2** You need to remove the comments from the monitor commands in the PERFSVM user ID's PROFILE EXEC in order to enable the monitor domain data that you want to collect.

In order to do this you need to stop Performance Toolkit for VM by pressing the PF3 Quit Key twice. Then XEDIT the PROFILE EXEC, make your changes, and type FILE on the XEDIT command line. Restart Performance Toolkit for VM by typing PROFILE and pressing enter. Disconnect the PERFSVM user ID by typing DISC and pressing enter.

Note: If this has not been done then when you get to the section 'Performance Monitoring Mode', in the "Guided Tour" chapter, in the z/VM: Performance Toolkit Guide, you will not have any monitor data collected for analysis.

- $\bf 3$ Refer to the chapter 'Preparing the Performance Toolkit' in the z/VM: Performance Toolkit Guide for information on interfaces that can be set up with Performance Toolkit for VM, such as an Internet Interface. This chapter will also refer you to the "Guided Tour" chapter in the z/VM: Performance Toolkit Guide for installation verification steps.
- **4** You may also want to have the PERFSVM user ID automatically started when z/VM is IPL'd. See the CP Planning and Administration Guide for information on how to add entries to the PROFILE EXEC for the AUTOLOG1 user ID. Remember that the SFS servers need to be started before PERFSVM if you've installed on SFS. Also, If you are starting the web interface, you'll need TCPIP started before trying to start PERFSVM. Also, if your installation is using an External Security Manager (ESM) you should review its program directory for additional AUTOLOG considerations.

Performance Toolkit for VM is now installed and built on your system.

7.0 Service Instructions

Note - z/VM Automated Service Procedure

The **preferred** method for installing service to Performance Toolkit for VM is to use the z/VM automated service procedure (use of the **SERVICE** and **PUT2PROD** commands).

If you have chosen to use the automated procedure to apply preventive (RSU) and CORrective service to your z/VM system, you need to follow the service instructions documented in the *z/VM:* Guide for Automated Installation and Service manual instead of those presented here.

RSU Warning

If applying a Performance Toolkit for VM RSU go to the instructions in Appendix A, "Applying a Recommended Service Upgrade (RSU) For Performance Toolkit for VM" on page 27. You will return to a step in this chapter as specified in that appendix.

This section of the Program Directory contains the procedure to install CORrective service to Performance Toolkit for VM. VMSES/E is used to install service for Performance Toolkit for VM.

To become more familiar with service using VMSES/E, you should read the introductory chapters in the *z/VM: VMSES/E Introduction and Reference*. This manual also contains the command syntax for the VMSES/E commands listed in the procedure.

Note: Each step of the servicing instructions must be followed. Do not skip any step unless directed to do so. All instructions showing accessing of disks assume the use of default minidisk addresses. If different minidisk addresses are used, or if using a shared file system, change the instructions appropriately.

7.1 VMSES/E Service Process Overview

The following is a brief description of the main steps in servicing Performance Toolkit for VM using VMSES/E.

Setup Environment

Access the Software Inventory disk. Use VMFSETUP command to establish the correct minidisk access order.

Merge Service

Use the VMFMRDSK command to clear the alternate apply disk before receiving new service. This allows you to remove the new service if a serious problem is found.

· Receive Service

The VMFREC command receives service from the delivery media and places it on the DELTA disk.

· Apply Service

The VMFAPPLY command updates the version vector table (VVT), which identifies the service level of all the serviced parts. In addition, AUX files are generated from the VVT for parts that require them.

• Reapply Local Service (if applicable)

All local service (mods) must be entered into the Software Inventory to allow VMSES/E to track the changes and build them into the system. Refer to Chapter 7 in the z/VM: Service Guide for this procedure.

· Build New Levels

The build task generates the serviced level of an object and places the new object on a test BUILD disk.

Place the New Service into Production

Once the service is satisfactorily tested it should be put into production by copying the new service to the production disk, etc.

7.2 Servicing Performance Toolkit for VM

RSU Warning

If applying a Performance Toolkit for VM RSU go to the instructions in Appendix A, "Applying a Recommended Service Upgrade (RSU) For Performance Toolkit for VM" on page 27. You will return to a step in this chapter as specified in that appendix.

7.2.1 Prepare to Receive Service

Electronic Service (envelope file) -

If you have received the service electronically or on CD-ROM, follow the appropriate instructions to retrieve and decompress the envelope file(s) to your A-disk. The decompression is currently done by using the DETERSE MODULE (shipped with VMSES/E).

The documentation envelope and the service (PTF) envelope files must have a file type of SERVLINK. Make note of the file names that you are using as you will need to enter them in place of the variable envfilename in the VMFREC commands that follow.

The ppfname used throughout these servicing instructions is 6vmptk10, which assumes you are using the PPF supplied by IBM for Performance Toolkit for VM. If you have your own PPF override file for Performance Toolkit for VM, you should use your file's ppfname instead of 6vmptk10. The ppfname you use should be used **throughout** the rest of this procedure, unless otherwise stated differently.

- 1 Logon to user ID 6VMPTK10
- 2 If the Software Inventory disk (51D) was accessed R/O (read only) then establish write access to the Software Inventory disk.

Note: If the MAINT 51D minidisk was accessed R/O, you will need to have the user that has it accessed R/W link it R/O. You can then issue the following commands to obtain R/W access to it. Do not use mw mode. Do not continue with these procedures until a R/W link is established to the 51D minidisk.

link maint 51d 51d mr access 51d d

The 51D minidisk is where the VMSES/E Software Inventory files and other product dependent files reside.

- 3 Have the Performance Toolkit for VM CORrective service tape mounted and attached to user ID 6VMPTK10. If you have a CORrective service envelope (SERVLINK) file make sure that is it available on the A-disk or any minidisk or SFS directory accessed as file mode C.
- **4** Receive the documentation.
 - **a** If receiving the service from tape

vmfrec info

The INFO option loads the documentation (including the product service memo) to the 191 disk.

b If receiving the service from an envelope file

vmfrec info (env envfilename

envfilename is the file name of the documentation envelope (SERVLINK) file.

The INFO option loads the documentation (including the product service memo) to the 191 disk.

5 Check the receive message log (\$VMFREC \$MSGLOG) for warning and error messages.

vmfview receive

Also make note of which products and components have service. To do this, use the PF5 key to show all status messages which identify the products with service.

6 Read the product memo (6VMPTK10 MEMO) before going on.

xedit 6vmptk10 memo

7 Setup the correct product access order.

vmfsetup 6vmptk10 {perftk | perftksfs}

Use perftk for installing on minidisks or perftksfs for installing in Shared File System directories.

8 Merge previously applied service to ensure that you have a clean alternate APPLY disk for new service.

vmfmrdsk 6vmptk10 {perftk | perftksfs} apply

Use perftk for installing on minidisks or perftksfs for installing in Shared File System directories.

This command clears the alternate APPLY disk.

9 Review the merge message log (\$VMFMRD \$MSGLOG). If necessary, correct any problems before going on. For information about handling specific error messages, see the applicable System Messages and Codes, or use on-line HELP.

vmfview mrd

7.2.2 Receive the Service

Note: If you are installing multiple service tapes, you can receive all of the service for this prodid before applying and building it.

For **each** service tape or electronic envelope you want to receive, do the following:

1 Receive the service.

a If receiving the service from tape

vmfrec ppf 6vmptk10 {perftk | perftksfs}

Use perftk for installing on minidisks or perftksfs for installing in Shared File System directories.

This command receives service from your service tape. All new service is loaded to the DELTA disk.

b If receiving the service from the PTF envelope file

vmfrec ppf 6vmptk10 {perftk | perftksfs} (env envfilename

Use **perftk** for installing on minidisks or **perftksfs** for installing in Shared File System directories.

envfilename is the file name of the service (PTF) envelope (SERVLINK) file.

This command receives service from your service envelope. All new service is loaded to the DELTA disk.

2 Review the receive message log (\$VMFREC \$MSGLOG). If necessary, correct any problems before going on. For information about handling specific error messages, see the applicable System Messages and Codes, or use on-line HELP.

vmfview receive

7.2.3 Apply the Service

1 Apply the new service.

vmfapply ppf 6vmptk10 {perftk | perftksfs}

Use **perftk** for installing on minidisks or **perftksfs** for installing in Shared File System directories.

This command applies the service that you just received. The version vector table (VVT) is updated with all serviced parts and all necessary AUX files are generated on the alternate APPLY disk.

Note: If you receive a return code of 4 this may indicate that you have local modifications that need to be reworked so make sure you review the VMFAPPLY message log as documented in the next step.

2 Review the apply message log (\$VMFAPP \$MSGLOG). If necessary, correct any problems before going on. For information about handling specific error messages, see the applicable System Messages and Codes, or use on-line HELP.

vmfview apply

Note

If you get the message VMFAPP2120W you must re-apply any local modifications before building the new Performance Toolkit for VM. It is very important that you rework your local modifications to sample customization files which have been serviced.

Refer to Chapter 7, 'Reworking Local Service and Modifications', in the z/VM: Service Guide. Follow the steps that are applicable to your local modification.

The following substitutions need to be made:

- zvm should be 6vmptk10
- compname should be perftk or perftksfs (minidisk or SFS)
- fm-local should be the filemode where the 2C4 is accessed

If you have changed any of the installation parameters through a PPF override, you need to substitute your changed values where applicable.

Keep in mind that when you get to the "Return to the Appropriate Section to Build Remaining Objects" or "Rebuild Remaining Objects" step in the z/VM: Service Guide, you should return to this program directory at 7.2.4, "Update the Build Status Table" on page 22.

(Note that you will need to use (all instead of (serviced on the VMSES/E VMFBLD command when re-building any segments.)

Appendix A. Applying a Recommended Service Upgrade (RSU) For Performance Toolkit for VM

Note - z/VM Automated Service Procedure

The **preferred** method for installing service to Performance Toolkit for VM is to use the z/VM automated service procedure (use of the **SERVICE** and **PUT2PROD** commands).

If you have chosen to use the automated procedure to apply preventive (RSU) and CORrective service to your z/VM system, you need to follow the service instructions documented in the *z/VM: Guide for Automated Installation and Service* manual instead of those presented here.

Note! -

You should first read through the RSU hard copy memo contained with the tape before continuing with these instructions.

The RSU is structured to install all PTFs included on the tape plus the tape files containing the preapplied service and prebuilt objects. All PTF-related files are loaded to the DELTA disk. The tape file containing the preapplied service, i.e. containing the results of VMFAPPLY, is loaded to the alternate APPLY disk and the contents of the tape files containing prebuilt objects are loaded to the appropriate Build disks.

Points to consider about using the Product Service Upgrade procedure are:

- This process will alter customizable flat files, such as FCONX \$PROFILE, if they have been serviced.
 If you used the local modification process to update these files then you will be able to rework your modifications.
- Planning must be done (such as determining any DASD size changes, and determining what service, if any, on your existing system is not contained on the RSU) prior to actually loading the service from the RSU. These tasks will be discussed.

The following outline is an overview of what tasks need to be performed during the PSU procedure:

· Prepare System

In this task, you will receive the documentation contained on the RSU and determine the DASD required to install the RSU.

Merge Service

Use the VMFMRDSK command to clear the alternate APPLY disk before receiving the RSU. This allows you to remove the new service if a serious problem is found.

· Receive Service

The VMFINS command receives service from the RSU and places it on the DELTA disk.

Apply Additional Service

The VMFAPPLY command updates the version vector table (VVT), which identifies the service level of all the serviced parts. In addition, AUX files are generated from the VVT for parts that require them. These steps are used to reapply service that was not contained on the refresh tape that was already installed for Performance Toolkit for VM.

Reapply Local Service (if applicable)

All local service must be entered into the Software Inventory to allow VMSES/E to track the changes and build them into the system.

· Build a New Level

The build task generates the serviced level of an object and places the new object on a Build disk.

Place the New Service into Production

Once the service is satisfactorily tested it should be put into production by copying the new service to the production disk, etc.

A.1 Apply Performance Toolkit for VM RSU

A.1.1 Prepare Your System for Service Refresh

Electronic Service (envelope file)

If you have received the RSU electronically or on CD-ROM, follow the appropriate instructions to retrieve and decompress the envelope file(s) to your A-disk. The decompression is currently done by using the DETERSE MODULE (shipped with VMSES/E).

The service (RSU PTF) envelope files must have a file type of SERVLINK. Make note of the file names that you are using as you will need to enter them in place of the variable envfilename in the VMFINS commands that follow.

The documentation envelope file will be a readable flat file after DETERSE is run against it. It will not get used in the following RSU application instructions.

The ppfname used throughout these instructions is 6vmptk10, which assumes you are using the PPF supplied by IBM for Performance Toolkit for VM. If you have your own PPF override file for Performance Toolkit for VM you should use your file's ppfname instead of 6vmptk10. The ppfname you use should be used throughout the rest of this procedure.

- 1 Log on to the Performance Toolkit for VM service user ID 6VMPTK10
- **2** If the Software Inventory disk (51D) was accessed R/O (read only) then establish write access to the Software Inventory disk.

Note: If the MAINT 51D minidisk was accessed R/O because someone else has it R/W, you will need to have that user link it R/O. You can then issue the following commands to obtain R/W access to it.

link MAINT 51d 51d mr access 51d d

The 51D minidisk is the default minidisk where the VMSES/E Software Inventory files and other product dependent files reside.

If your VMSES/E Software Inventory is on a different minidisk or in shared file (SFS), use that address or SFS directory name instead.

- **3** Mount the RSU tape on the tape drive as virtual device 181. You must use 181. If you have the RSU in a service envelope (SERVLINK) file make sure that is it available on the A-disk or any minidisk or SFS directory accessed as C.
- **4** Receive the documentation:

Receive the documentation on the tape for the RSU. This step will also load the cumulative Apply Status Table (6VMPTK10 SRVAPPS) which identifies all preapplied service. These files are loaded to the 51D disk.

a If receiving the RSU from tape

vmfins install info (nomemo

b If receiving the RSU from an envelope file

vmfins install info (nomemo env envfilename

envfilename is the file name of the service (RSU PTF) envelope file (SERVLINK) that represents volume 1 of the RSU.

5 Determine DASD sizes for disks to receive service:

In order to receive the service from the RSU, you need to have adequate space available on the alternate APPLY, DELTA, and BUILD disks or directories. The required sizes are identified in the Performance Toolkit for VM documentation (6VMPTK10 MEMO D) received in the previous step.

6 Setup the correct minidisk access order

vmfsetup 6vmptk10 {perftk|perftksfs}

Use component name perftk if the product is installed on minidisks or perftksfs if the product is installed in SFS.

7 Merge the APPLY disks for Performance Toolkit for VM:

Next, you must prepare your system to receive the service from the RSU. To do this, you must first clear the alternate APPLY disk for receipt of the service.

Enter the VMFMRDSK command to merge the alternate APPLY disk to the APPLY disk. This will clear the alternate APPLY disk.

vmfmrdsk 6vmptk10 {perftk|perftksfs} apply

Use component name perftk if the product is installed on minidisks or perftksfs if the product is installed in SFS.

8 Invoke the VMFPSU command to identify any local modifications.

vmfpsu 6vmptk10 {perftk|perftksfs}

Use component name perftk if the product is installed on minidisks or perftksfs if the product is installed in SFS.

This command produces an output file that contains information about the service on the RSU compared against the service and local modifications on your system. The file name is 6VMPTK10 PSUPLAN. If local modifications affect objects that have been serviced, the FCX\$PSU\$ \$SELECT file will be created or updated to force the rebuild of those parts.

A.1.2 Receive the Preapplied, Prebuilt Service

1 Refresh the Performance Toolkit for VM service disks by loading new service from the RSU:

a If receiving the RSU from tape

vmfins install ppf 6VMPTK10 {perftk|perftksfs} (nomemo nolink

Use component name perftk if the product is installed on minidisks or perftksfs if the product is installed in SFS.

b If receiving the RSU from an envelope file

vmfins install ppf 6VMPTK10 {perftk|perftksfs} (nomemo nolink env envfilename

Use component name perftk if the product is installed on minidisks or perftksfs if the product is installed in SFS.

envfilename is the file name of the service (RSU PTF) envelope file (SERVLINK) that represents volume 1 of the RSU. If you have more than one envelope file for the RSU you will be prompted for the others when needed.

A.1.3 Process Additional Service

1 Apply additional service:

The VMFAPPLY command is used to reapply service that was not contained on the refresh tape that was already installed for the component.

Applying service with preapplied, prebuilt service will reapply any reach-ahead service that may be on the system or indicate that there are no reach-ahead PTFs to be applied.

vmfapply ppf 6vmptk10 {perftk|perftksfs}

Use component name perftk if the product is installed on minidisks or perftksfs if the product is installed in SFS.

Messages VMFAPP2122E and VMFAPP2109R will be displayed only if you have reach-ahead service that needs to be reapplied.

VMFAPP2122E The set of PTFs in the Apply Status Table (6VMPTK10 SRVAPPS) on the 2A2 (G) disk is not a subset of the PTFs in the highest Level Apply Status Table on the 2A6 (F) disk. This is an inconsistent state. VMFAPP2109R VMFAPPLY will automatically correct the problem identified by message 2122E by including the missing PTFs in the current Apply List. Enter (1) to continue; (0) to guit. 1

If you receive these messages, enter 1 for VMFAPPLY to reapply the reach-ahead service.

> f 2 Check the apply message log (\P VMFAPP \P MSGLOG) for warning and error messages. If necessary, correct any problems before going on. For information about handling specific apply messages, see applicable System Messages and Codes, or use online HELP.

vmfview apply

3 If necessary, rework local service

The **6VMPTK10 PSUPLAN** (output from running the VMFPSU command), can be used to indicate what local service or modifications are affected by the RSU tape. If a PTF is applied and it contains service to a part for which you have a local modification, you will need to rework the local modification. Refer to the z/VM: Service Guide.

Note: It is very important that you rework your local modifications to sample customization files which have been serviced.

A.1.3.1 Build the New Service Level

The last task is to rebuild all objects that were affected by reach-ahead service that was reapplied, local modifications, and saved segments. Continue with Section 7.2.4, "Update the Build Status Table" on page 22 and complete the rest of Section 7.

A.2 Determine RSU Service Level

The service contained on each RSU constitutes a new service level. Use this service level when ordering corrective service. The service level is updated in the system inventory when the RSU is installed.

To find out the current service level for Performance Toolkit for VM you can use the VMFSIM QUERY command or if you use the automated service procedures you can use SERVICE command with the STATUS operand.

The following is an example using VMFSIM to query the current RSU service level.

vmfsim query vm sysrecs tdata :ppf {perftk|perftksfs} :stat

Use **perftk** in installed on minidisks or **perftksfs** if installed in Shared File System directories.

The output from this command is similar to the following console log. The last part of the status line indicates the RSU service level: 0901 Use the entry with the lastest time and date stamp when figuring out the RSU level.

Appendix B. Moving Performance Toolkit for VM to SFS Directories and Creating a PPF Override

By default, Performance Toolkit for VM is installed to minidisks as part of the z/VM System deliverable unless you choose to install Performance Toolkit for VM to SFS during the initial z/VM installation. If you did not install Performance Toolkit for VM into SFS directories and want to move it now, you can. Refer to Figure 6 on page 9 to see which minidisks can reside in SFS. You can use either the default file pool, VMSYS, or a file pool of your choosing.

A summary of the steps that are needed to place Performance Toolkit for VM into SFS are:

- Allocate space in the user-defined or default file pool
- Provide the installation user ID, 6VMPTK10, access to the file pool
- · Create the necessary Performance Toolkit for VM subdirectories
- · Copy files from the minidisks to the new SFS subdirectories
- Create a PPF override, if not using the default file pool or subdirectory names.

Where to next -

You need to do one of the following:

- If you want to place Performance Toolkit for VM into SFS directories using the defaults defined in the 6VMPTK10 PPF file you should use the MOVE2SFS command, as documented in the z/VM: CP Commands and Utilities Reference manual.
- If you want to place Performance Toolkit for VM into your own user-defined file pool or SFS directories, continue with the instructions in B.1, "Setup SFS File Pool and Directories" on page 35.
- If you **only need to create a PPF override**, continue with the instructions in B.3, "Create Product Parameter File (PPF) Override" on page 38.

If you were pointed to this appendix from another section and you have completed the steps required (whether provided in this appendix or in the *z/VM: CP Commands and Utilities Reference*) you should now return to your original section to continue.

B.1 Setup SFS File Pool and Directories

Notes:

- The steps that follow help you determine the Performance Toolkit for VM file pool space requirements, file pool enrollment, and SFS directory definitions. If not all of these steps are required - for example, if you are changing only SFS directory or subdirectory names - adapt these instructions as needed for your environment.
- The steps that follow assume that a user-defined SFS file pool name is being used. If you will be using the VM default file pool name, VMSYS, substitute it in any place you see the text 'user-defined file pool' or variable userfilepool.
- 3. For more information about planning for, generating and managing a file pool and server, see *z/VM: CMS File Pool Planning, Administration and Operation.*
 - **1** Determine the number of 4k blocks that are required for the SFS directories, for each user ID, by adding up the 4K blocks required for each SFS directory you plan to use.

If you intend to use all of the default Performance Toolkit for VM SFS directories, the 4K block requirements for each directory are summarized in Figure 6 on page 9.

This information will be used when the 6VMPTK10 and PERFSVM user IDs are enrolled in the user-defined file pool.

2 Enroll users 6VMPTK10 and PERFSVM in the user-defined file pool using the ENROLL USER command:

ENROLL USER 6VMPTK10 userfilepool: (BLOCKS blocks ENROLL USER PERFSVM userfilepool: (BLOCKS blocks

where *blocks* is the number of 4k blocks that you calculated in the previous step.

Note: This must be done from a user ID that is an administrator for the user-defined file pool.

Determine if there are enough blocks available in the file pool to install Performance Toolkit for VM. This information can be obtained from the QUERY FILEPOOL STORGRP command. The output from this command is a list of storage groups and the number of 4K blocks free. If the number of blocks free is smaller than the total 4K blocks needed (refer to Figure 6 on page 9 to obtain total blocks needed) to install Performance Toolkit for VM you need to add space to the file pool. See z/VM: CMS File Pool Planning, Administration, and Operation manual for information on adding space to a file pool.

4 Create the necessary subdirectories using the CREATE DIRECTORY command.

Note: All of the Performance Toolkit for VM subdirectories are shown in the create directory commands. If you are not planning to create all of them, then just enter the commands for the ones you are planning to create.

A complete list of default Performance Toolkit for VM SFS directories is provided in Figure 6 on page 9.

If you have changed any of the default SFS directory names then use your new name in place of the old name in the create directory command.

set filepool userfilepool:

5 Give the **MAINT** user ID READ authority to the general-use test BUILD directory, and give the **PERFSVM** user ID READ authority to the 6VMPTK10 user ID's test and production BUILD, configuration and help disks using the GRANT AUTHORITY command.

grant auth userfilepool:6VMPTK10.perftk.tbuild to MAINT (read newread grant auth userfilepool:6VMPTK10.perftk.tbuild to PERFSVM (read newread grant auth userfilepool:6VMPTK10.perftk.pbuild to PERFSVM (read newread grant auth userfilepool:6VMPTK10.perftk.config to PERFSVM (read newread grant auth userfilepool:6VMPTK10.perftk.perftkhelp to PERFSVM (read newread

> If necessary, see the z/VM: CMS Commands and Utilities Reference manual for more information about the GRANT AUTHORITY command.

6 If you intend to use an SFS directory as the work space for the 6VMPTK10 and PERFSVM user id's, update the IPL control statement in the 6VMPTK10 and PERFSVM CP user directory entry to look like:

IPL CMS PARM FILEPOOL userfilepool

This will cause CMS to automatically access 6VMPTK10's and PERFSVM's top directory as file mode A. Refer to the z/VM:CP Planning and Administration for information on updating the CP user directory.

B.2 Copy Minidisk (or SFS) Files to SFS Directories

1 Copy the files from the Performance Toolkit for VM minidisks (or from the VMSYS file pool if Performance Toolkit for VM is already installed there) to your new user-defined SFS file pool and directories using the VMFCOPY command.

Note: Repeat the ACCESS and VMFCOPY commands, that follow, for each disk or SFS directory you need to copy. Refer to Figure 6 on page 9 for the default minidisk and SFS directory names for Performance Toolkit for VM.

access vdev e access dirid f vmfcopy * * e = = f (prodid 6vmptk10%PERFTK olddate replace

Where

- · vdev is the minidisk you are copying files from. If you are copying from SFS then substitute the SFS directory name in place of vdev.
- dirid is the name of the (target) SFS directory that you are copying files to.
- 6VMPTK10%PERFTK is the PRODID defined within the 6VMPTK10 PPF file for the minidisk and SFS Performance Toolkit for VM components.

The VMFCOPY command will update the VMSES PARTCAT file on the target directory.

B.3 Create Product Parameter File (PPF) Override

This section provides information to help you create a product parameter file (PPF) override. The example used in this section is how to change the shared file system (SFS) file pool where Performance Toolkit for VM files reside. Refer to the z/VM: VMSES/E Introduction and Reference for more information on PPF overrides.

Note: Do not modify the product supplied 6VMPTK10 \$PPF or 6VMPTK10 PPF files to change the VMSYS file pool name or any other installation parameters. If the 6VMPTK10 \$PPF file is serviced, the existing \$PPF file will be replaced, and any changes to that file will be lost. By creating your own \$PPF override, your updates will be preserved.

The following process describes changing the default file pool name, "VMSYS" to "MYPOOL1":

1 Create a new \$PPF override file or edit an existing override file.

xedit overname \$PPF fm2

overname is the PPF override file name (such as "myperftk") that you want to use.

fm is an appropriate file mode. If you create this file yourself, specify a file mode of A.

If you modify an existing override file, specify a file mode of A or D, based on where the file currently resides (A being the file mode of a R/W 191 minidisk, or equivalent; D, that of the MAINT 51D minidisk).

2 Create (or modify as required) the Variable Declarations (:DCL.) section for the PERFTKSFS override area so that it resembles the :DCL. section as shown below.

Notes:

- a. If you service by using the automated service commands, SERVICE, PUT2PROD and LOCALMOD, then you will want to make sure you create an override to the SERVP2P \$PPF for the PERFTKSFS and PERFTKSFSP2P components. To do this you will follow the example below with the following changes:
 - The OVERLST statement should be:

```
:OVERLST. PERFTKSFS PERFTKSFSP2P
```

- The :PERFTKSFS statement should be:
 - :PERFTKSFS. PERFTKSFS SERVP2P
- Repeat the DCL update but change the :PERFTKSFS to be
 - :PERFTKSFSP2P. PERFTKSFSP2P SERVP2P

This override will replace the *:DCL.* section of the PERFTKSFS override area of the 6VMPTK10 \$PPF file.

3 If your \$PPF override file was created as file mode A, copy it to the Software Inventory minidisk (MAINT 51D). The default file mode is D.

file copyfile overname \$PPF fm = = d (olddate

4 Compile your changes to create the usable *overname* PPF file.

vmfppf overname *

where overname is the file name of your \$PPF override file.

Now that the overname PPF file has been created, you should specify overname instead of 6VMPTK10 as the PPF name to be used for any VMSES/E commands that require a PPF name.

If you service by using the automated service commands, e.g. SERVICE, PUT2PROD, you need to update the VM SYSSUF Software Inventory table. If you created a PPF override to the SERVP2P \$PPF file then you need to make sure that the override name you created is reflected in the PPF tags for Performance Toolkit for VM in the VM SYSSUF table. You will use the new PPF override name with the PERFTKSFS component name twice and the new PPF override name with the PERFTKSFSP2P component name once in the change to the VM SYSSUF table. You can use the VMFUPDAT SYSSUF command to view and change the VM SYSSUF table PPF information.

Appendix C. Disabling Performance Toolkit for VM

If you had licensed and enabled Performance Toolkit for VM, function level 610 for use, and no longer are licensed for Performance Toolkit for VM, you need to explicitly disable Performance Toolkit for VM. Perform the following steps to disable Performance Toolkit for VM.

- 1 Logon to MAINT user ID (that has privilege class E authority and has access to the VMSES/E code disk (default MAINT 5E5) and VMSES/E Software Inventory disk (default MAINT 51D)).
- **2** Establish read access to VMSES/E code.

link maint 5e5 5e5 rr access 5e5 b

The 5E5 minidisk is where VMSES/E resides.

3 If the Software Inventory disk (51D) was accessed R/O (read only) then establish write access to the Software Inventory disk.

Note: If the MAINT 51D minidisk was accessed R/O, you will need to have the user who has it linked R/W link it as R/O. You can then issue the following command to obtain write access to it. **Do not use** *mw* **mode.** Do not continue with these procedures until a R/W link is established to the 51D minidisk.

link maint 51d 51d mr access 51d d

The 51D minidisk is where the VMSES/E Software Inventory files and other product dependent files reside.

4 Set Performance Toolkit for VM to the disabled state.

service perftk disable

This command will perform the following:

- Set Performance Toolkit for VM as DISABLED in VMSES/E and within CP.
- Update the CP system configuration file (SYSTEM CONFIG) on the CP primary (default CF1) parm disk.
- **5** If you have the PERFSVM user ID automatically started when z/VM is IPL'd, you should remove it from the PROFILE EXEC for the AUTOLOG1 or AUTOLOG2 user ID.

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
